OGDEN MUNICIPAL BUILDING

City Halls often act as downtown anchors and focal spaces in communities where citizens can gather and unite, cultural hubs where much more than pulling a building permit or paying a parking ticket takes place. Such is the case with the historic Ogden Municipal Building, an Art Deco giant constructed during the Great Depression.

The Ogden Municipal Building is one of three dominant Art Deco-style buildings dotting the city's landscape, the other two being the U.S. Forest Service Building and Ogden High School. Several other smaller-scale Deco buildings can be found throughout the city as well, including the LDS 21st Ward Meetinghouse, the Union Stockyard Exchange Building, and Quincy Elementary School.

The masterminds behind these works were Leslie Hodgson and his architectural business partner, Myrl McClenahan. Hodgson was a Salt Lake native whose father, a contractor, introduced Leslie to architecture at a young age. Originally from Nebraska, Myrl and his family moved to Salt Lake in 1906 while he was in high school. McClenahan was briefly employed by Leslie Hodgson in 1912, helping design mostly residential buildings, then joined the Army for a few years, and after his discharge from the Army in 1919, he rejoined Hodgson, and the firm Hodgson and McClenahan was established, focusing this time on public, commercial, and religious buildings. Hodgson and McClenahan worked together until McClenahan's death in 1940, while he was working on the Ogden Municipal Building. Prior to incorporating Art Deco into their repertoire, the firm designed many other prominent buildings in various styles in Ogden and the region, including the Egyptian Theater and Bigelow Hotel. What we see as the historic built environment in Ogden today is largely due to the work of this duo.

Construction for the Ogden Municipal Building started in late 1938 and was completed in 1940, being dedicated in November of that year. The main impetus for the building's construction was that the city and county had outgrown their spaces in the existing municipal building, jail, and other government offices. Ogden City and Weber County joined forces in early 1938 to apply to the federal Public Works Administration for assistance to construct the building. The PWA, which was a New Deal-era agency that oversaw large-scale civic construction projects, overwhelmingly supported the proposal. The initial budget for the project was \$600,000, with the PWA offering to cover half the costs,

while the city and county were to split the remaining half. It was an effective cooperative effort among the city, county, and federal government. The project ended up costing \$900,000 due to increased costs in labor and materials, and was delayed by several months because of changes in plans during construction. All changes in plans had to be sent to San Francisco to be approved by PWA officials.

The site chosen for the building was just south of where the existing city hall and jail were located. Those buildings and some of the existing landscape were cleared to make room. George A. Whitmeyer and Sons, who had worked with the architects on past projects and many other large projects in the Ogden area, were hired as contractors.

A classic Art Deco-style building, it stands 12 stories tall, is symmetrical, and is composed of masonry using ample brick and terra cotta. It features straight lines, angular geometric decorative patterns, a flat roof, and metal sash windows, all common features of the Art Deco style. At the time, the term Art Deco wasn't popularly used, so this building's architecture was referred to as Progressive Styling or Restrained Contemporary Design. The terms Modernistic and Streamlined were also used to describe it, as well as being dubbed an Ancient Assyrian Form, pertaining to its broad base and tall tower shape extending upward.

Touted as a sturdy building, it was built with reinforced concrete to withstand a moderate earthquake. However, additional measures were needed years later (a major renovation was completed in 2000) to retrofit the building and address seismic deficiencies, as the understanding of seismic forces differed in 1940. The masonry for the building was provided by the Ogden Pressed Brick Company in Harrisville, and Thomas Child and Company from Salt Lake was the masonry contractor. The selection of a Salt Lake masonry company over an Ogden one drew the ire of many locals. It has also been noted that Leslie Hodgson had a hand in selecting many of the bricks based on their color and deciding where they would be placed on the building, with darker hued bricks at the base and lighter colors higher up on the tower.

Other prominent features include the metal geometric-shaped grill window coverings, period light fixtures, and metal-framed windows, which are replacements replicating the original historic windows. To the chagrin of the Weber County Commission, the words **MUNICIPAL BUILDING** are engraved above the main entrance in terra cotta. The commission wanted the words **WEBER COUNTY** included, but lost their plea.



Original uses in the building included police and sheriff offices, public works, city recorder and clerk offices, district courts and judges, a law library and reading room, city attorneys, health offices, city council rooms and offices, county commission offices, engineering and surveying offices, draftsmen rooms, and city and county jails. Uses changed over the years. The jail and county offices eventually moved out, and as part of the major renovation in 2000, the building was reprogrammed with new offices and other uses created for Ogden City.

The building was constructed to last and remains an enduring landmark because of the vision of the architects and those involved in public building at the time. More than anything, it was a symbol of progress as America was beginning to emerge from the Great Depression despite the looming conflict of World War II. It was progressive in all aspects, from its advanced construction and systems technologies to its funding sources and supporters, and to its forward-looking, modern architectural style. In fact, at the dedication ceremony on November 6, 1940, it received the award for the best public building in Utah for 1940 from the American Institute of Architects. And rightfully so.

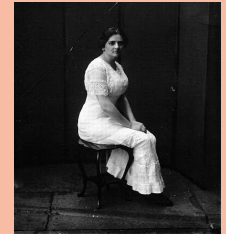

Belle Fisher: A Madame of the Intermountain West

In the shifting moral geography of the Intermountain West at the turn of the twentieth century, few figures moved as fluidly — or as controversially — through its cities and mining towns as Belle Fisher. Known by multiple aliases, including Mary Black, Minnie Myers, and Margaret Dreich, Fisher built a reputation across Utah, Idaho, and Wyoming as a determined — and deeply polarizing — entrepreneur in the region’s shadow economy. Her story, pieced together through newspaper reports and court records, reveals both the opportunities and dangers facing women navigating frontier-era vice districts.

Belle Fisher first appeared in Salt Lake City newspapers in the 1890s, arrested on charges related to prostitution. She later surfaced in Park City, where she reportedly operated as a madame and claimed to own property — an assertion that, if true, suggests she had already achieved a degree of financial independence unusual for women in her line of work. Her name appeared repeatedly in Utah court records in connection with arrests for theft and disputes over jewelry, including one case in which she attempted to reclaim diamonds she insisted had only been held temporarily by another woman.

By July 1904, Fisher had arrived in Ogden, then one of the busiest railroad and commercial hubs in the region. Local authorities already knew her reputation. City Detective Pender and Captain Brown tracked her to a rooming house, where she was arrested alongside two young women from Salt Lake City, ages twenty and sixteen. According to their statements, Fisher had offered to help them travel to Portland, Oregon. Instead, they were taken to a lodging house where three men awaited them. When police intervened and explained the likely circumstances they had narrowly avoided, the younger girl reportedly wept and thanked officers for rescuing her from what she called a “vile woman.”

At the station, Fisher admitted she had intended to take the girls to Idaho to work in one of her brothels. She told police she had come to Ogden after hearing how profitable the city could be for someone in her trade. Charged as a “procuress” — a legal term used at the time for someone who recruited women into prostitution — she posted \$25 bail but failed to appear for her hearing and left town soon after. Officers concluded she had departed quickly, likely supported by the considerable income she earned through her operations.

Fisher’s influence extended well beyond Utah. In Kemmerer, Wyoming, she ran the Monte Carlo dance hall with her husband, Martin W. Foley. When Foley stabbed a man to death for dancing too closely with her, Fisher spent thousands of dollars attempting to shape the trial’s outcome — moving witnesses out of state and allegedly attempting to influence jurors. Foley, once associated

with Butch Cassidy’s Wild Bunch, was convicted of murder but had his death sentence commuted to life imprisonment after an expensive defense effort. Following the trial, Fisher became unwelcome in Wyoming and returned to Utah.

She resurfaced in Ogden again in 1909, this time charged with mail fraud after authorities discovered she had used the postal service to recruit young women into prostitution. Convicted of misusing second-class mailing privileges to distribute recruitment letters, she paid a \$20 fine and was released. After that, Belle Fisher vanished from regional newspapers as suddenly as she had appeared.

Whether remembered as a criminal operator, a survivor navigating limited options, or a figure emblematic of the West’s vice economies, Belle Fisher’s story illustrates how mobility, money, and reputation shaped women’s lives in the early twentieth-century Intermountain West. Her trail through Ogden and beyond remains a striking reminder that the region’s history was never as orderly — or as predictable — as civic leaders preferred to portray.

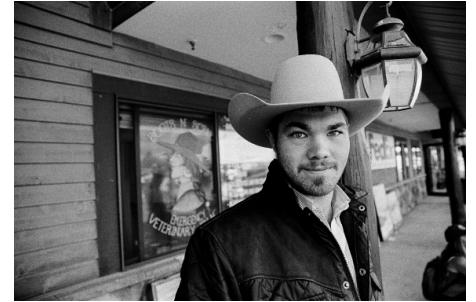

STREET CLEANER

The night is calm. It is the summer solstice and a peaceful Monday evening in Ogden, Utah. It is past midnight and I sit in the front of our office looking out the window onto Washington Boulevard in the middle of downtown Ogden. Moroni looks down upon our fair city. Mondays are always slow in town. A few cars drag by, nothing like the weekend before when it was full of energy and activity as the dragsters raced on and boys and girls screamed out at each other from their speedsters.

It is a wonderful game of human fireflies of nature. It is an Ogden tradition that has endured for many decades. I know; I did it too when I was a teen. Tonight is the night that folks are home with their families or recovering from the full weekend after the first day back to work. This is the longest day of the year. It is the summer solstice. From here on out the days get shorter, already. Then again the cycle continues until winter is upon us and we just wish for an evening like this. Tonight is an extension of this longest day we just had. It is gone already.

The dust is settling, the air is clear. The Boulevard is long and wide and seems to be relieved of all the activity as the pavement and new asphalt cools through the night after a long warm day. All of a sudden lights flash off of the wall and brightens the room completely. At first it is startling because I didn't expect gold flashing lights to enter the room so dramatically. It is the nightly ritual of the street cleaner. He is here consistently every night, right on schedule, clearing away the debris of the day. The street

sweeper is soon behind him. A few times a month they actually hose off the sidewalks with a high-power spray. This is a daily duty that most folks do not see or realize even happens.

I look at a young man who is emptying the city garbage of the day so we don't have to look or think of our trash again. The last of the day is gone with the hauling off of our remnants just like the memories and activities of the day. He is taken for granted.

He is on his own. He is alone. He is doing an important duty. We wake each morning and learn to expect the tidiness and efficiency of this one effort. It makes me think of all the jobs within the fiber of the city that get very little credit and attention and I notice and that we do take them for granted. There are so many services and people that make this city what it is and I wonder how we can show our appreciation.

Perhaps the mere mention or recognition of them is enough. I watch the trash hauler work diligently and I feel pride knowing that he is taking care of us. How many others in the service-oriented businesses do we take for granted and don't even realize that they are watching over us?

Somebody is keeping the lights on. Somebody is keeping us safe. Somebody is on call in case a fire might break out. Someone prepares our food or stocks the shelves for our convenience.

Thank goodness these people exist. Thank goodness for modern times.

The trash haulers and street cleaners are the most important of all to me. Without them we would be full of debris and disease. Pests, rodents and vermin would run all around. We are healthy and clean because of them. That is because of this wonderful street cleaner. It is a thankless job. He goes along his way without the expectation to be greeted or acknowledged or even thanked. No tip for him.

He is satisfied to know he is doing well for others and taking care of a vital purpose, though not as glamorous as other jobs or positions in the community by some standards. He is just as much or even more important than some of the more notable and high profile titles in the roster of a city.

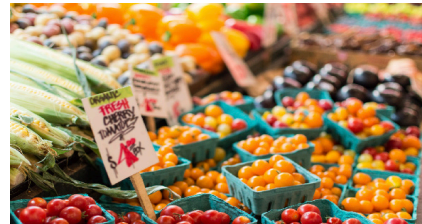

I'm at the farmer's market a lot. One interaction comes to mind. A customer approached a farm stand. The farmer greeted them by name. Asked about their kids. Asked how their tomatoes did last year. The customer laughed and admitted they had accidentally killed every plant except the basil.

It was a tiny interaction. Maybe thirty seconds long. But I remember thinking how unusual that has become.

Over the next year, I'll be writing a series about local economies, community habits, and the systems that shape how we live here in Ogden. Not from a place of nostalgia or guilt, but from a place of curiosity. Because somewhere along the way, we stopped knowing the people around us. And I think that has changed more than just where we shop.

Most of us now buy our food, clothes, gifts, and household items from places where nobody knows our names, our families, or our stories. We order from apps. We use self-checkout lanes. We interact with warehouses and algorithms more than neighbors.

And to be clear, I don't think this happened because people stopped caring about community. I think we built a world that made convenience easier than connection.

Modern life is exhausting. People are working longer hours, commuting farther, balancing tighter budgets, and carrying constant mental overload. Convenience became survival for a lot of families. Huge corporations figured out how to remove friction from buying things. One click. Same-day delivery. Massive parking lots. Infinite inventory.

Slowly, shopping stopped being relational and became transactional and there's a hidden cost to that shift.

When we stop regularly interacting with local people, we stop seeing ourselves as part of a shared community. The baker becomes a brand

instead of a person. The farmer becomes a label. The mechanic becomes a Google review. The coffee shop becomes just another stop in the day instead of a gathering place.

Local economies are about far more than money. They shape whether neighborhoods know each other. Whether people feel invested in the places they live. Whether kids grow up recognizing familiar faces around town. Whether we trust each other enough to work together when things get hard.

I see this constantly through local food work.

At farmers markets, people don't just buy vegetables. They trade recipes. They ask how someone's season is going. They introduce their kids to growers. They stop and talk to neighbors they haven't seen in months. I've watched community happen in real time, not because somebody built an app for it, but because actual people stayed connected enough to care. That kind of connection requires spaces where humans regularly interact with each other outside of obligation. And historically, local businesses helped create those spaces. Corner stores. Diners. Markets. Barbershops. Bookstores. Coffee shops. Places where people became familiar with one another without needing a formal invitation.

Many of those spaces still exist in Ogden. That's one of the reasons people love this city so fiercely. There is still a visible sense of community here. You can still walk into places where somebody remembers your usual order. You can still buy bread from someone who baked it that morning. You can still meet the grower who planted your food.

That matters because people protect what they feel connected to.

When communities lose local gathering spaces and local commerce, they often lose civic engagement too. People stop attending neighborhood events. Stop participating in local decisions. Stop feeling ownership over

what happens around them. Life starts feeling increasingly isolated, outsourced, and impersonal.

And loneliness has become one of the defining feelings of modern life.

I don't think rebuilding local economies means rejecting modern life or pretending large stores don't have a place. Most people, myself included, still rely on convenience sometimes. This conversation is not about perfection.

It's about direction.

Maybe rebuilding community starts with something smaller than we imagine.

Maybe it starts by buying bread from the local bakery once a month instead of never. Maybe it starts by learning the name of the person growing your food. Maybe it starts by choosing one neighborhood coffee shop to become a regular at. Maybe it starts by recognizing that every dollar we spend is also shaping the kind of community we live in.

Because local economies are not just about commerce.

They are about whether communities still know how to belong to each other.



Will Ski 4 Food: Film by locals families friends Ogden's Untold Ski Story



Long before freestyle skiing found its way onto the world stage, a group of skiers in Northern Utah were quietly rewriting the rules.

Will Ski 4 Food is a feature documentary that tells the story of a rebellious crew of tight-knit skiers from Ogden—often referred to as “The Ogden Mafia”

—whose creativity and fearlessness helped spark the birth of freestyle skiing in the 1970s. At a time when the competitive sport was defined by structure and tradition, a new wave of skiers—known then as as “hotdoggers”—began pushing beyond those boundaries, experimenting with style, tricks, and creativity in ways the sport had never seen before. Many of those moments unfolded right here in Ogden Valley.

At the center of the film is cinematographer Gary Nate, who in 1973 made a life-changing decision to leave his job and pursue an unlikely path: making an independent ski film. That leap of faith led to a nearly 40-year career working alongside legendary filmmaker Warren Miller, documenting some of the most iconic moments in ski history. But according to the filmmakers, this story is about much more than skiing.

“We’ve always known these stories were special, but the more people we talk to, the more we realize just how much started right here in Ogden,” said River Hyde, one of the film’s producers. “There’s a real responsibility to get it right and to honor the people who helped shape this culture.”

The documentary is being led by a small independent team: Colby Nate (Director), River Hyde, and Rob Tovar. They have spent the past several months tracking down the voices and stories behind the movement. For Nate, the project began on a personal level. “This started as a way to better understand my dad’s story,

” he said. “But it became clear that it’s much bigger than that. It’s about a whole community of skiers who took risks and changed the sport forever, and about my dad’s role in capturing it all, helping bring those moments to life through his work behind the camera.”

Filmmaker Rob Tovar said the themes extend well beyond the slopes.

“Even if you’ve never skied before, this is a story about creativity, rebellion, and chasing something you believe in,” Tovar said. “That’s something anyone can connect with.”

So far, the team has interviewed several members of the local skiing community, including Becki Salerno Hughes, who shared memories of her brother Bob Salerno, as well as Kenny Wright, Michael Hart, Bobbie Chambers, Jeff Perkins Hyde, and Tom Leavitt. Their firsthand accounts offer a vivid window into a time when the sport was still being invented. Additional interviews are currently in the works to further round out the story, including conversations with Craig and Tina Olsen, Wayne Wong, Scot Schmidt, as well as perspectives that help preserve and share the stories of Bobbie Burns, creator of “The Ski,” Gary Nate, and Robert Young.

What began as a family-driven effort has since grown into a larger mission: preserving a piece of Ogden’s cultural and athletic history before it fades. Now in its final stages of production, Will Ski 4 Food is moving through editing, sound design, archival restoration, with plans to enter the film festival circuit in the near future.

The filmmakers say the community still plays an important role in bringing the story to life and expect to launch a public fundraising

campaign later this year via Kickstarter. “This is truly a community story,” Hyde said. “If people have old photos, film footage, or memorabilia from those early days, we’d love to see it and help preserve it.”

Community members interested in contributing materials can reach out to the production team via email. Any content used in the film will require a standard release form.

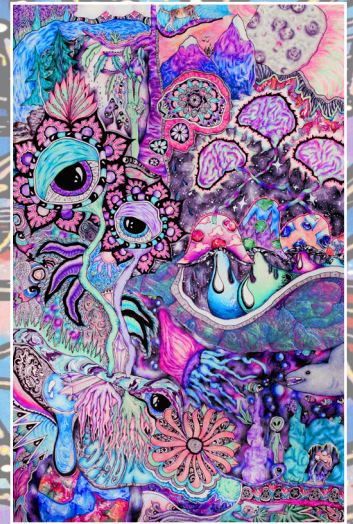
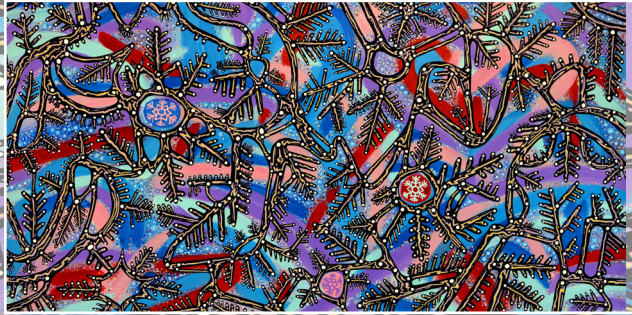

Wonder Block Hotel Project Moves Forward on Historic 25th Street

A new hotel planned as part of the Wonder-Block development is moving forward on Historic 25th Street, bringing additional vitality and visitor presence to one of Ogden's most recognized districts. The project represents the third and final phase of the broader Wonder Block redevelopment plan, which has been gradually transforming the block between Grant and Lincoln avenues ON 26th street with a mix of residential, commercial, and pedestrian-oriented improvements.

The proposed hotel will face north onto 25th Street and is designed to complement the architectural rhythm of the historic district while clearly reflecting contemporary construction. According to planning documents submitted to the Ogden Landmarks Commission, the building utilizes a commercial vernacular approach that incorporates traditional proportions and materials without attempting to replicate historic styles directly.

Architectural features include vertically proportioned window bays, a defined cornice line, masonry façade, and an active ground-floor presence intended for retail or restaurant use. The design also incorporates modern materials such as metal-framed windows and cast-in-place concrete elements while maintaining compatibility with surrounding historic structures.

The building height generated discussion during the review process, even with some opposition due to height by some commissioners, it ultimately received approval by the commission. Project representatives indicated that four stories were necessary to achieve economic feasibility for hotel operations. Boutique and urban hotels often require a certain number of guest rooms in order to support staffing, operations, and long-term sustainability.

In addition to the hotel structure, the project includes a pedestrian walkway connection linking 25th Street to the interior Wonder-Block plaza, improving circulation between the historic street and the new development areas to the south.

The project also includes the renovation of the historic Browns Ice Cream building, many will remember as the Wonder Bread retail store, preserving an existing structure while adding new complementary development adjacent to it. Together, the combination of adaptive reuse and contextual infill continues the incremental revitalization pattern that has shaped downtown Ogden in recent decades.

As with many projects located within historic districts, discussion focused on balancing preservation priorities with economic realities and evolving urban needs. The approved design reflects an approach consistent with national preservation guidelines, which encourage new construction to be distinguishable from historic buildings while remaining compatible in scale, proportion, and materials.

When completed, the hotel is expected to increase visitor activity along 25th Street, supporting restaurants, shops, galleries, and entertainment venues that contribute to the district's ongoing vitality.

SIDEBAR Why a Hotel on 25th Street Matters Historically:

Hotels have long played an important role in the development of Historic 25th Street. During Ogden's railroad era, the city served as a major transportation hub in the American West, bringing travelers, workers, and entrepreneurs through Union Station and into the surrounding commercial district.

Historic hotels such as the Reed Hotel and the Healy Hotel once accommodated visitors arriving by rail, contributing to the economic vitality that supported restaurants, saloons, retail stores, and entertainment venues along 25th Street.

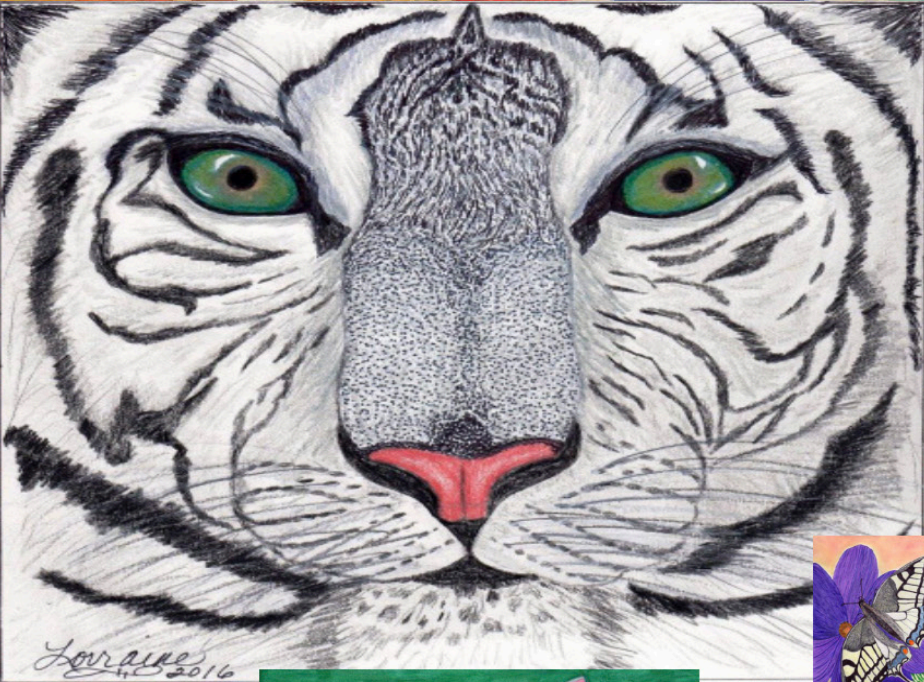
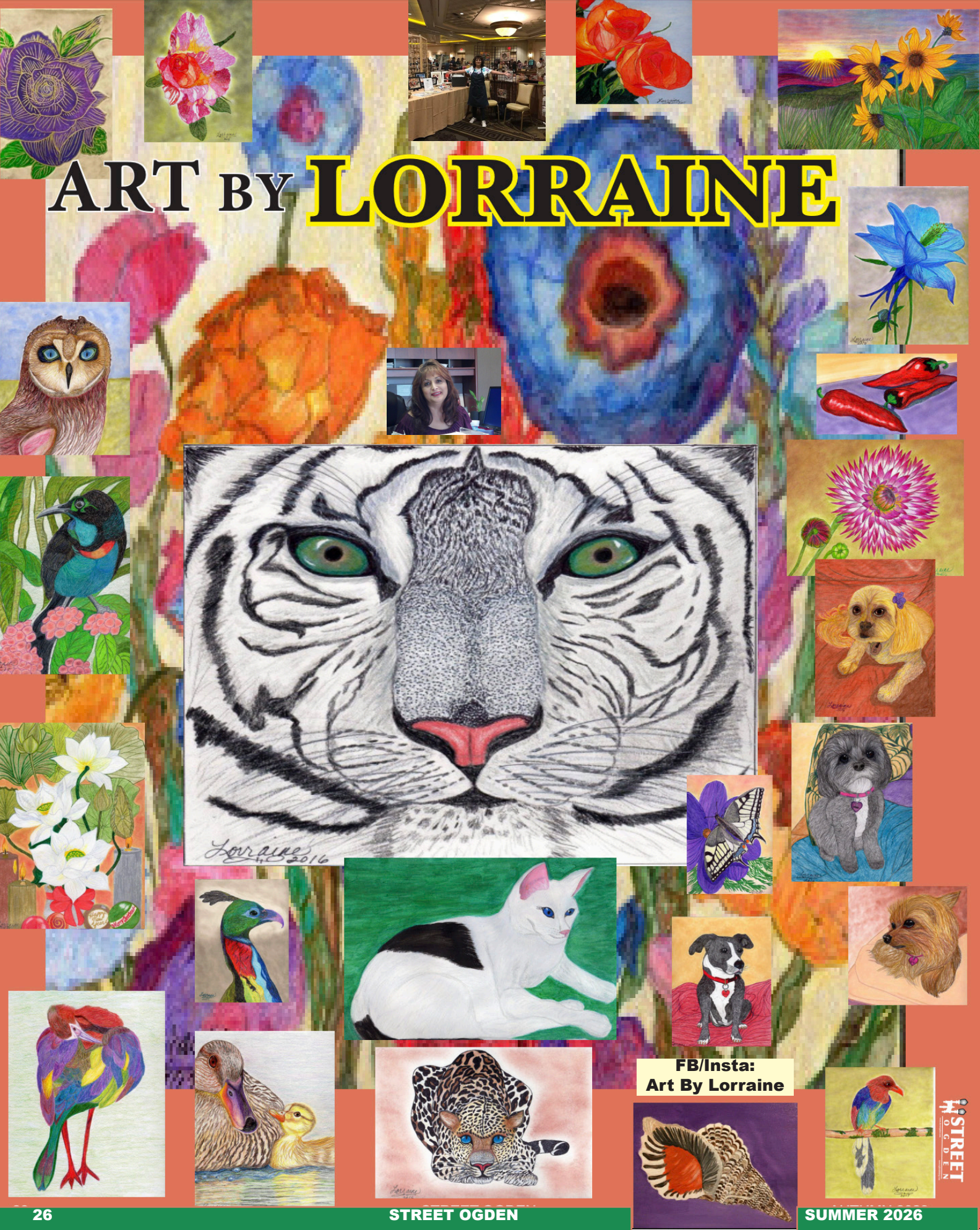
The introduction of a new hotel along the corridor reflects a continuation of this long-standing pattern. Hospitality uses historically clustered near transportation centers, reinforcing street activity and extending the amount of time visitors spend within local business districts.

Rather than introducing a new concept to the street, the WonderBlock Hotel reestablishes a traditional downtown function, welcoming visitors and strengthening the pedestrian environment that has defined the district for generations.

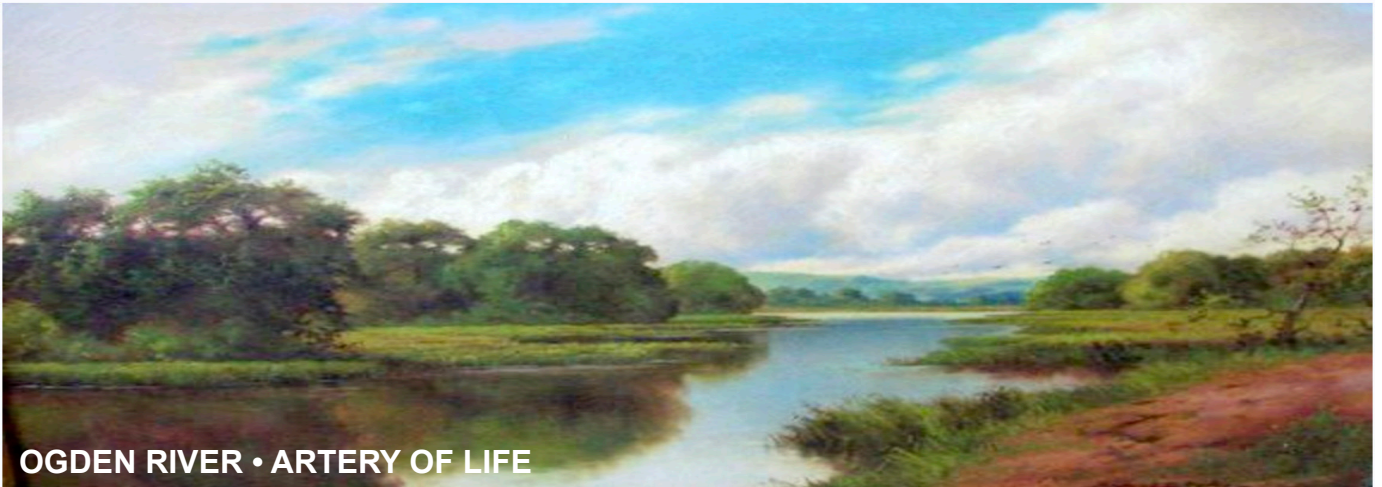
The project also demonstrates how contemporary architecture can contribute to historic districts without replicating earlier styles, allowing each era to add its own chapter to the evolving story of the street.

As Ogden continues to grow, projects such as the WonderBlock Hotel illustrate how investment, preservation, and thoughtful design can work together to support both economic vitality and historic character.

OGDEN RIVER • ARTERY OF LIFE

In 1825, Peter Skene Ogden recorded catching close to 600 beavers in Ogden Valley. But today, beavers are nearly excluded from the Ogden River Basin due to human encroachment. This exclusion was a long process that started over a century ago.

By 1850, the first diversion of water from the Ogden River was made in order to provide irrigation for the settlers' crops. However, by the early 1900s, the late summer flow was not enough to provide the citizens with the water they needed and in 1937, Pineview Dam was constructed to provide irrigation to the growing communities along the Wasatch Front.

But the large-scale rerouting and damming of water often causes disruptions in the aquatic insect population, which some scientists see as a sign of water quality. This disruption can lead to a decline in not only water quality but also in biodiversity and the economics of fisheries.

A study done in 2024 along the Ogden River and its tributaries attempted to assess the health of the Ogden River as well as the North, Middle, and South forks. Previous reports had found several issues along the tributaries as well as within Pineview Dam. Issues such as dewatering and dissolved oxygen.

This study is one of the first of its kind along the river. Without any comprehensive previous data to consider, it was mostly finding a baseline for future studies. The study was conducted through a collaboration of Trout Unlimit-

ed and the Salmonfly Project. It was done by sampling macroinvertebrates and their habitats.

According to this initial research, the water quality of the overall basin is good but variations throughout the basin makes continued monitoring necessary. The North Fork was found to have areas of very little water which is concerning, but the quality of the biodiversity in areas where water was flowing was high.

The lower portions of the Middle and South Fork were found to be in worse shape. Based on hydrological mapping, they were found to only have intermittent flow and to suffer from dewatering. The assumption made by the study is that the water issues are partly due to nutrient pollution which often comes from agricultural runoff.

The bad news of the study is that the Ogden River itself has the worst ecosystem integrity out of them all. The issue, according to the study, may be the damming of the river at Pineview Dam and the urban runoff the river receives as it meanders through the city.

One of the insects that was focused on for this study was the Salmonfly (*Pteronarcys californica*), known as the angler's best friend. The appearance of these insects means that the trout are going to be feeding and ripe for the catching. The study found a decrease in the population of the Salmonfly along the majority of the river, a bad portent for the future. The reason for this population drop is believed to be from organic pollu-

tion on the lower end of the river.

The issues raised by the study are worrying. Our continued growth and expansion throughout the basin of the Ogden River is going to increase pressure upon the ecosystem that provides the beauty and life that everyone loves about this place.

The river is an often forgotten beauty in our city. If you don't make a conscious effort to visit the river, you can go a long time without ever thinking about it. But the health of the river is paramount to the health of Ogden and its surrounding communities. Further study of this river will help us to understand how we can protect it better.

Eccles Art Center Launches Capital Campaign

If you follow the Ogden arts community closely, much of this story may already be familiar. The Eccles Art Center, housed in the stately red brick Victorian mansion at the corner of Jefferson Avenue and 26th Street, was once the home of Bertha Jensen Eccles, her lumber tycoon husband David Eccles (yes, that Eccles), and their twelve children. Bertha, one of early Utah's most influential women, left a lasting mark on Ogden's history and civic life.

But what many people may not realize is just how deeply her life — and her home — became woven into the cultural fabric of Ogden itself.

Short in stature (4'9") but possessing a giant heart, Bertha Eccles was "universally beloved" by the Ogden community. She opened her home as a gathering place for the community and played a direct role in establishing organizations that still shape Utah today. Inside the walls of what is now the Eccles Art Center, Bertha founded Utah's first Girl Scout troop — something many are surprised to learn began right here in Ogden. She also helped

establish Utah's first Junior League, the Daughters of the Utah Pioneers, and the Children's Aid Society, while opening her home to Red Cross auxiliary efforts during World War I. The mansion became far more than a private residence; it was a place where ideas about service, education, and community support were transformed into lasting institutions.

When Bertha died, she willed her home to serve the community and the arts. Her wish was honored: in the late 1940s, the mansion became Bertha Eccles Hall, a dormitory for women attending Weber College (now Weber State University). In 1959, the home was transformed once again into a community art center, a role it continues to serve today. A striking example of Queen Anne Victorian architecture, the mansion was added to the National Register of Historic Places in 1974, nearly two decades after becoming the home of the Eccles Art Center.

While many in the community may assume the Eccles Art Center is financially secure due to its long history and recognizable name, the reality behind the scenes is far more fragile. As a non-profit organization, the EAC

is member-owned and does not receive funding from endowments or trusts. "Many see the name 'Eccles' and assume we are managed by the various Eccles Foundations," says EAC Executive Director Patrick Poce. "We share a common name because we are named after Bertha Eccles and are located in her home, but we are not an extension of any current Eccles foundations."

As the home is now more than 130 years old, caring for the building requires continual maintenance and unexpected emergency repairs, such as plumbing, roofing, and structural work. As the building continues to age, these needs will likely increase alongside regular operating costs. At a time when families, nonprofits, and community organizations everywhere are navigating rising costs and tighter budgets, these added pressures on the Art Center's resources may directly impact future programming and operations.

To address these challenges, the Eccles Art Center is launching a capital campaign to establish a dedicated \$1 million reserve fund. The goal is to create long-term financial stability, ensuring that future building emergencies do not come at the expense of exhi-

bitions, classes, or community programs.

Eccles Art Center staff, board members, and campaign committee members say the effort is about more than building maintenance—it is about protecting a historic cultural space that has served generations of Northern Utah families, artists, and students. Community support helps protect not only one of Ogden's most historic buildings, but also the programs and opportunities that take place within its walls each year: monthly art exhibits and competitions open to any age, scholarships for local high school students, outreach programs in schools and assisted living facilities, summer art camps for children, wellness and arts classes, and free public access to one of Utah's most beloved historic homes.

For more than 65 years, the Eccles Art Center has remained open to the public as a place where creativity, education, and community come together. Every contribution, no matter the size, helps ensure the Art Center can continue welcoming artists, students, families, and visitors for generations to come.

HISTORY OF TATTOO CULTURE IN AMERICA

Tattooing in America tells a story of identity, rebellion, belonging, and art. Like jazz, rock and roll, and street newspapers, tattoos grew from the edges of society before moving into the cultural mainstream.

The earliest known professional tattoo artist in the United States was Martin Hildebrandt, a German immigrant who tattooed Civil War soldiers in the 1860s. Tattoos served practical purposes during wartime, identifying bodies if soldiers were killed far from home. They also served emotional purposes, marking loyalty, love, and remembrance.

By the late 1800s, tattooing had spread through port cities such as New York, Boston, and San Francisco. Sailors returning from voyages in the Pacific brought home tattoo traditions learned from Polynesian cultures. Anchors, swallows, ships, and pin-up girls became part of American visual language. Each symbol had meaning: swallows represented miles traveled, anchors symbolized stability, and hearts marked devotion to loved ones left behind.

In 1891, Samuel O'Reilly patented the first electric tattoo machine based on Thomas Edison's electric pen. This invention transformed tattooing from a slow hand process into a faster, more precise art form. The electric machine helped establish tattooing as a profession and allowed artists to develop more detailed imagery.

During the early 20th century, tattoo shops flourished along the Bowery in New York City and in other working-class districts. Tattooing was associated with soldiers, sailors, circus performers, and laborers. Tattooed individuals were sometimes featured in traveling sideshows, where heavily tattooed people became curiosities to the public.

World War II further cemented tattoo culture in America. Soldiers and sailors marked their bodies with patriotic symbols,

unit insignias, and reminders of home. Tattoos became part of military tradition and masculine identity.

Following the war, tattooing became associated with motorcycle clubs, rock and roll culture, and counterculture movements of the 1950s through the 1970s. Tattoos were often viewed as rebellious or outside the mainstream. Shops existed quietly in certain neighborhoods, often passed down from artist to apprentice.

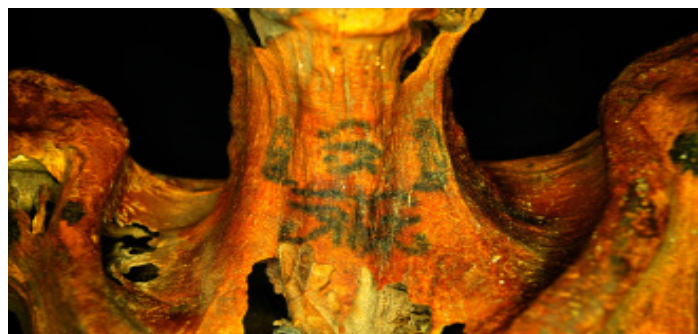
By the 1980s and 1990s, tattooing experienced a creative renaissance. Artists began studying global tattoo traditions, incorporating Japanese, tribal, and fine art influences. Tattoo magazines, conventions, and improved sterilization practices helped legitimize the profession. Tattooing gained respect as a skilled craft requiring training, discipline, and artistic vision.

Today, tattoo culture in America is widely accepted across professions and generations. Doctors, teachers, business owners, and artists proudly wear tattoos. Styles range from bold traditional imagery to hyper-realistic portraits, geometric patterns, and minimalist fine-line work.

Tattooing has become both personal expression and collectible art. Many clients research artists carefully and travel for specific styles. The tattoo studio has evolved from a hidden storefront into a creative studio environment similar to a gallery.

In cities like Ogden, tattoo culture reflects local identity. Railroad history, mountain landscapes, music scenes, and community pride often appear in local designs. Tattoos continue to serve as markers of memory, belonging, and personal history.

Like a printed publication, tattoos document a moment in time. They tell future generations who we were, what we valued, and how we chose to be seen.



HISTORY OF TATTOOING THROUGH HISTORY CULTURES OF THE PAST

Tattooing is one of humanity's oldest art forms. Long before ink was placed on paper, pigment was placed beneath the skin. Archaeological evidence shows that humans have been tattooing for more than 5,000 years.

One of the earliest examples is Ötzi the Iceman, a preserved body discovered in the Alps in 1991. Dating back to approximately 3300 BCE, Ötzi's body contains over sixty tattoo markings composed of simple lines and crosses. Many researchers believe these tattoos were therapeutic, placed near joints where he experienced pain, similar to early acupuncture practices.

Ancient Egyptian mummies have also been found with tattoos, particularly on female bodies. These markings often consisted of dots and geometric patterns and may have symbolized fertility, protection, or spiritual devotion.

In Polynesia, tattooing became a highly developed cultural art. The word "tattoo" itself comes from the Polynesian word tatau, meaning to strike or mark. Tattoos in Polynesian cultures signified genealogy, social rank, achievements, and spiritual identity. The process was ceremonial and deeply meaningful, often marking important life transitions.

Japanese tattooing, known as irezumi, developed into a complex visual tradition featuring dragons, koi fish, samurai, and mythological figures. These full-body compositions told stories and symbolized strength, perseverance, and honor. During certain historical

periods, tattoos in Japan were also used to mark criminals, creating a complicated relationship between tattooing and social perception.

Indigenous cultures throughout North and South America practiced tattooing for spiritual and tribal purposes. Tattoos were used to signify belonging, courage, protection, and rites of passage. Tools were often made from bone, thorns, or sharpened wood, and pigments came from natural sources such as ash and plant dyes.

In many cultures, tattoos were believed to hold protective power. Some markings were intended to guide individuals in the afterlife, while others were believed to ward off illness or evil spirits.

Throughout history, tattooing has moved between sacred ritual and social stigma. At times it has been honored as spiritual expression; at other times discouraged or forbidden by religious or political authorities.

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Beer Making Origins and the Journey from Local Brews to the Craft Revolution The First Fermentation

Beer predates written history. Long before cities, railroads, or refrigeration, humans discovered fermentation by accident — grain left in water began to transform. What resulted was nutritious, mildly intoxicating, and safer than often-contaminated water sources.

In ancient Mesopotamia, workers were paid in beer. Egyptians brewed it daily, including laborers building the pyramids. Early beer was thick, cloudy, and consumed with straws to avoid floating grain husks. It was food as much as drink.

Brewing was originally a domestic craft, often performed by women. Later, monasteries refined the process and helped standardize recipes. Monks carefully documented ingredients and techniques, elevating brewing into both art and science. Many traditional European beer styles trace their lineage to these early religious communities.

Beer became central to social life — served at celebrations, religious gatherings, and everyday meals. Each region developed its own styles based on available grains, water chemistry, and climate.

Local identity was always part of beer's DNA.

Industrialization and the Birth of Mass Distribution

The 1800s transformed brewing forever. Refrigeration allowed beer to be stored longer and shipped further. Pasteurization improved consistency. Railroads connected breweries to distant markets.

Beer was no longer limited to local consumption.

Large commercial breweries expanded rapidly, producing consistent products that could be distributed nationally. Branding and advertising emerged as powerful tools. Beer became industrialized, standardized, and widely accessible.

In the United States, Prohibition (1920–1933) disrupted brewing dramatically. Thousands of breweries closed. Skills and recipes were lost. When Prohibition ended, only a small number of producers remained, and many focused on lighter, more neutral beer styles appealing to broad audiences.

By the mid-1900s, the beer industry had consolidated into a small number of dominant national brands. Consistency replaced regional variety. Beer was reliable, affordable, and widely available — but often lacked distinctive local character.

For a time, the diversity of beer styles seemed at risk of disappearing.

The Craft Beer Renaissance

Beginning in the late 1970s, independent brewers began reviving traditional methods and experimenting with bold new flavors. Inspired by historic European brewing styles and motivated by creativity, these pioneers sparked what became known as the craft beer movement.

Consumers embraced variety again.

Craft breweries emphasized quality ingredients, small batches, and innovation. Styles such as India Pale Ales (IPAs), porters, stouts, saisons, wheat beers, and sour ales reintroduced complexity and personality to the beer landscape.

Breweries once again became community gathering places — spaces where conversation, music, art, and collaboration flourished. Many craft brewers partnered with local artists, hosted live music, and created environments that felt more like cultural hubs than simple bars.

Technology also played a role. Modern brewing equipment, improved ingredient sourcing, and digital marketing allowed small breweries to reach audiences more effectively than ever before.

Beer returned to its roots — local, expressive, and personal.

Ogden and Utah Brewing: A Local Connection

Utah's brewing history reflects the broader national story. Early settlers brewed beer using local grains, though regulation and cultural influences often shaped availability and production.

Ogden, as a railroad hub, was especially connected to the distribution networks that helped expand beer's reach across the western United States. Rail transport allowed goods — including beer — to travel efficiently between regions, contributing to economic growth and cultural exchange.

Today, Ogden and Weber County are part of the modern craft beer revival. Local breweries emphasize community identity, experimentation, and quality ingredients. Taprooms have become gathering spaces where neighbors meet, ideas are shared, and creativity is

encouraged. Just as beer once reflected the character of medieval villages, today's craft breweries often reflect the personality of their cities — independent, inventive, and rooted in place.

Beer Comes Full Circle

Beer began as a local necessity, evolved into an industrial powerhouse, and has now returned to its origins as a local craft supported by passionate makers and curious drinkers.

Each pint carries thousands of years of innovation — from clay vessels and monastery cellars to stainless steel tanks and neighborhood taprooms.

Beer is history you can taste.

Where the past meets the present, the future is always on tap.

Ogden Punk Rock Local Legends

FORTY FOUR YEARS OF PUNK ROCKIN' OGDEN 1982-2026... and still SHREDDIN'



In the early 80's five young men full of angst, energy, boredom and time to kill sat in a basement in Ogden. Add drums, guitars, bass and a juvenile delinquent front man and you have the perfect recipe for Punk Rock! From that mix emerged the band that to this day remains the center of the punk scene here in Ogden: Draize Method.

Those basement practices slowly turned into shows for their friends. Soon they started playing gigs at places like Bonneville and Canyon Alternative High Schools, booked or not. None of them were 21 yet so they played anywhere that would let them. They mostly played house parties, but they would gig wherever they could. Even an old hotdog stand called Casper's. With every show, their following grew and grew.

It didn't take long before Draize Method was *the* punk band of Ogden. The experience is something else. If

you've been to a show, you're familiar with frontman Dan Fonoti's onstage pre-show stretch and warm-up routine. This may seem a little out of place, but there is a good reason for it. He is about to Jackknife five feet into the air, commanding the start of the show as he lands firmly back on the ground. When you see it, it almost feels like you got punched in the chest! These guys give it their all, and they play their guts out! If you don't leave a show sweaty and a little banged up, you're not doing it right. Whether you're in the band or in the crowd, the same rules apply. Dan knows this and the energy he brings is unparalleled.

Punk gave kids who felt overlooked, angry, bored, creative, or different a place to fit in. You didn't need expensive gear or music lessons. You just needed something to say and the guts to say it loud. That spirit is exactly where Draize Method came from.

You can't help but jump around when you hear Mike Albi bang the hell out of the drums at a speed that seems impossible to maintain. Draize doubles down on guitar with Justin Leeds and Todd Kirk shredding through each song like metal in a woodchipper. The big brother figure of the band, bass player Steve Poole keeps the chaos of the sound just inside the lines enough to keep the train from jumping the track. Together they have achieved over 40 years of ongoing, legit hardcore punk!

They gained momentum and notoriety by playing live on local radio stations and opening for bands such as "7 Seconds," "Fugazi", "Fear", "The Offspring", and "Minor Threat." In the years to come, they would grow from punk-ass kids to men with families and careers. all while retaining their loyalty and love for the music, their band, and each other.

Dan did not graduate high school. In fact, I don't think he actually ever went. Despite this, he has had a long successful career in construction. Steve Poole, aka "Of America", worked for his family business until he retired to become a full-time grandpa. Justin Leeds worked for the IRS for over 20 years. Todd Kirk became a drug enforcement officer. Ironic AF, considering it once took four police officers to get him into a cop car! In his retirement, he opened up a beer store here in Ogden called "Salt and Hops" on 27th Street near Adams. Steve Albi also answered the call to serve his community as a local fireman.

These guys have been best friends since they were kids. They have been through it all together. That includes marriages, kids, divorce, death and some pretty severe health issues. Through all the ups and downs, they have stuck by each other unwaveringly. They consider themselves brothers and refer to one

another as such. They speak out and stand up together against injustice no matter the cost, and that is truly punk. Draize Method continues to play shows today, mostly around Ogden, and so far they have no plans to throw in the towel. There is one song that has always stayed with me, "Die Trying." The song sums up who they are as people and the overall message of the band which is: "I can't change the world, the best I can do is die trying." I couldn't have said it better myself! Hats off to you boys!

When I asked Dan Fonoti what message he would like to share with their fans, family, friends and supporters, he had this to say: "For over four decades, the Ogden punk and hardcore scene has given us something far greater than a stage ever could — you gave us a home. Through every basement sets, all-ages halls, and bar gigs, you kept this alive with your loyalty, heart, and absolute refusal to let the world hold you down.

We grew up together here, and every set we've ever played carried the relentless energy of the people standing beside us. Thank you for allowing us to be here with you throughout a literal lifetime, and for proving that the people in a small city scene can and will leave a mark that lasts forever... or Die Trying."





25th Street Lives

Not a metaphor but actual breath drawn in through doorways that never quite close exhaled in laughter that leaks into the night air.

Its spine is brick, sun-warmed and winter-cracked, vertebrae laid by hands long gone, each building a rib holding in stories that refuse to stay buried.

The street has a pulse. You feel it in the low hum of passing cars, in the staggered rhythm of footsteps, heels, boots, late-night wandering, in the bassline slipping out of a bar like a second heartbeat just beneath the first.

By day, it blinks slowly, eyes half-lidded with coffee steam, watching painters, drifters, office ghosts move through its bloodstream. It listens more than it speaks, storing conversations in its marrow.

By night, it wakes hungry.

Neon becomes its nervous system, signals flashing from sign to sign, synapses firing red, blue, gold. It stretches, cracks its joints, pulls people inward like oxygen.

It remembers everything.

The railroad ghosts that still pace its edges, the whispered deals, the laughter, the fights, the boots that marched, the dresses that spun, the promises made too loudly and the ones broken quietly.

Nothing leaves. It just settles deeper, sediment in a living river.

Rain is how it cleanses. Snow is how it dreams.

In winter, it slows its breathing, wraps itself in white silence, lets footsteps soften into memory before they even fade.

But step onto it, really step, and it will know you.

It will taste the weight of your thoughts, measure your pace, decide whether to hold you or pass you through like a passing current.

Because 25th Street is not a place you visit.

It is a body you enter, a long, breathing thing of brick and light, and for a moment, however brief, it carries you as part of itself.

The Monster Beneath 25th Street

Beneath 25th Street in Ogden, where brick remembers weight and footsteps fade, there is a creature that chose not to be feared.

It does not roar. It hums.

Low and steady, like

water through old pipes, like a train passing far enough away to feel but not hear. The tunnels carry that sound as if they were made for it.

Its body is not one shape for long. Sometimes it gathers itself into something large, a suggestion of shoulders in the dark, sometimes it thins into mist along the walls, breathing through cracks in the mortar.

It has learned the language of quiet.

When the city above is restless, when laughter spills too loud or anger travels through the pavement in sharp, hurried steps, the creature presses closer to the ceiling of its world and listens.

It listens the way old wood listens, the way earth listens when it holds rain.

No one knows how long it has been there. It remembers boots and lanterns, coins dropped and never found, the hush of deals made below street level, the soft apologies spoken to no one.

It keeps these things.

Not as trophies, but as seeds.

When someone walks alone above, carrying too much of the day in their chest, the creature shifts beneath them, just enough.

A gentler step. A quieter echo. A feeling, brief and unprovable, that the ground has decided

to be kind.

Stray cats pause over certain grates and blink into the dark, unafraid. Water runs clearer where it rests. Even the air above those hidden paths feels slightly eased, as if tension has been lifted and set somewhere safe.

The creature does not want to be seen. It has seen what happens to things given names too loudly.

So it stays where the city forgets to look, curled in the long veins of tunnel and stone, breathing with the street above, keeping its careful watch.

If you stand on 25th Street at night, when the noise settles into something softer, you might feel it.

Not fear. Not even wonder.

Just a quiet sense that something large and gentle is holding the underside of the world together, and choosing, again and again, to do no harm.

Voices of Union Station

Inside Union Station, the clocks keep a careful face, but time loosens its collar after dark.

I went in when the doors were quiet, when footsteps echo like questions, and the last light hangs in the rafters like it forgot to leave.

They were already there.

Not appearing, not arriving, just present the way dust is present in a beam of light.

A conductor tipped his hat without moving his hand.

A porter leaned against a pillar that remembered his weight. An engineer stood with the patience of something that once commanded iron.

You do not ask ghosts if they are ghosts. You speak like you have been expected.

How were the runs tonight I said, and the room shifted closer.

Long, came the answer, not in words but in the settling of air, in the faint rhythm of wheels that no longer turn. Always long.

They spoke in fragments.

Schedules that bent but never broke, hands gone raw in winter, the way steam could feel alive when it rose into cold morning. They spoke of coffee poured too hot, of laughter between stops, of names called across platforms that still echo if you stand still enough.

One of them asked me if the trains still come through.

Sometimes, I said.

It seemed to please them and trouble them both.

A porter told me about watching people leave and knowing which

ones would not return. Not by logic, but by the way they held their coat, the way they looked at the edge of the platform as if it were already memory.

An engineer laughed, soft as rust, and said the machines had tempers and you learned them like you learned a person. Treat them wrong and they would remind you.

We stood there together in a station that still holds its breath between arrivals.

I realized then they were not trapped.

They were continuing.

Their voices threaded through the beams, through the ticket windows, through the long reach of track that disappears into distance and returns only in stories.

When I turned to leave the conductor tipped his hat again, this time almost visible.

Keep time, he said or something like it.

Outside, the night moved on as if nothing had happened.

But the rails hummed faintly beneath my feet, and I carried their conversation with me like a schedule written somewhere deeper than paper, a promise that even after departure something remains to speak to listen to remember.

Beginning June 15-17, 2026 (following a trial period), portions of downtown Ogden will move to a managed parking system. Here's what you need to know before you visit Historic 25th Street, The Junction, WonderBlock, concerts, restaurants, shopping, and downtown events.

(WonderBlock Garage, Electric Alley)

\$1.00 per hour

ADA PARKING

First 2 hours free

QUICK STOPS

Many paid spaces include a free 15-minute grace period for quick errands and pickups.

TWO-HOUR PARKING AREAS

Many surrounding downtown streets remain free with posted two-hour limits.

COMING TO AN EVENT? City officials recommend:

WONDERBLOCK GARAGE

For concerts, festivals, nightlife, and downtown events.

It offers the largest concentration of parking near the downtown core.

HOW DOES ENFORCEMENT WORK?

Parking ambassadors and enforcement staff will monitor parking areas.

Vehicles may receive citations if:

Parking time expires
Payment is not made
Vehicle is parked in the wrong zone
Posted restrictions are violated

Parking is monitored by license plate rather than traditional parking meters.

WHY IS THE CITY DOING THIS?

According to Ogden City, parking revenue will help:

Operate downtown parking facilities
Maintain parking garages and equipment
Support future parking improvements
Help pay debt associated with the WonderBlock parking garage project

City officials say the goal is to improve parking turnover and make spaces easier to find in high-demand areas.

ADA Parking: First 2 hours free

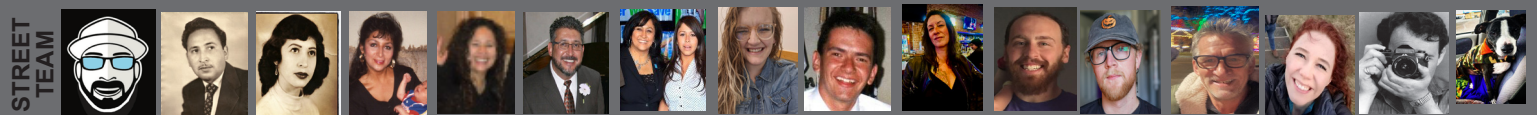

GHOST

GODFATHER'S PIZZA BOY IMAGE CAPTURED BY GHOST INVESTIGATORS SOCIETY

AUTHORITY NOTE

This article is a reprint from *Street Magazine*, Summer 2014. At the time of writing, the Godfather's Pizza Building had just been taken down, along with the surrounding block, to make way for the River Walkway.

It would take over a decade for the project to become what it is today. The space is now occupied by Tabco Pizza, and prior to that was home to Manhattan Pizzeria for many years.

A strange coincidence—this location has transformed a pizza restaurant for over 80 years.

The Godfather's Pizza restaurant dated on Washington Boulevard for 20 years. The business is no longer open, but the building has always been a favorite location for Ogden ghosts. Our story begins with Doug, a local and well-known who moved to the manager of Godfather's Pizza in 1995. His first night on the job, he was "haunted" by one of the building's many spirits, and it was only the aid of hundreds of experienced workers from other churches that saved him.

It was 11:00 and Doug had just finished his prep work, including the dough, and started off the pizza game, jobs, and lights in the dining room. Doug was holding up the papers in the back office when he was suddenly interrupted by hearing voices from the old jobster! Doug ran to the front of the restaurant to see if someone was giving a hand, but all he heard were the going lights and radio music from the old machine.

Doug let the old radio music continue but the fire still continued, so he tried the usual backup radio to get some music. Finally, he looked across the restaurant to get the help. Doug grabbed the old radio but found the fire still continued to be the only one that wasn't glowing! Doug ran.

Before then but his job on his first day, Doug decided to go back inside to help check up. The old jobster sat quietly in the dark with him. Doug figured the radio's speaker must have become another incident, but it was nearly the beginning of 11 years of doing the restaurant with spirits who appeared through Godfather's Pizza in frequency at the restaurant.

Another night, Doug ran to the kitchen when he was crying for help by the hot stove. Continued his job, Doug had the 100% the kitchen's first three around town. The boy paid him no mind, as Doug worked after him. Before Doug could reach him, the boy continued through the wall and disappeared as if he'd never been a customer in and out. "I never had love to stop that boy. Where did he go?"

The boy wasn't the only sighting in the restaurant. In fact, the staff became familiar with three different young boys, an Italian boy named, a French Canadian boy named, another ghost who spoke in a deep voice, and also appeared, one who always lived in the kitchen, the other two light bulbs, made the doors swing in and out, and the lights on.

One day one group of spirits that were seen at Godfather's, they all had one thing in common. They always traveled the same path through the restaurant—walk to north by either going straight through the kitchen or diagonally from customer to walk out the door, and out through the walkway doors, directions are both one-way, and when that light was on Godfather's Pizza was the Ogden River. It was one thing to find the Godfather's building with one who was able to walk to the river for Ogden's many generations. This would help explain why the phone always moved the same path through the restaurant (going in and out, walls, tables, or continuing) and why the typical ghost reported on their work with groups of generations and walls of life.

The original building was built 11 years ago specifically for Godfather's, the business working on it for 10 years prior, was known to a gas station for the 40s and 50s, and was an early hot location. The 19th Perseus Research Group, a nonprofit organization of professionals dedicated to better understanding paranormal activity through scientific research and investigation, has spent countless hours working to solve the Godfather's puzzle.

19th's current study of Godfather's Pizza in the fall of 1995. Their research shows that "There is one very big question... that the Godfather's Pizza was once a person's field which is where intelligent, dressed people like small, you, directly, and others who were not without a proper kind of connection were found. The field's location is just below the hill from the 19th Perseus Research Group's City Cemetery, which would suggest that theory. Before that an Italian grocery may be in the same way. Either way, you might want to know that city was visiting Washington Boulevard in the early 50s, construction was temporarily suspended when there was a street under the street."

"What developed was a phone call of the young boys who accompanied to improve the old process. (Show the phone to the light on the radio.)"

19th's current study of the puzzle, as they used it to a gas station, photograph to another one, and they might be able to show from the radio to an old radio. The report says that in "There is one that light from the kitchen above the front door suggests the time is in front of the window... It appears that the figure is standing inside the room, though there doesn't appear to be anyone physically in the room now." By looking at the phone lines we can see the person is that [ghost] appears to be a boy."

The phone was named "Godfather's Boy" and was with a general image, that it was published in the book that follows, *Street Spirit*, and *Haunted Place* by David Singer in 1997. Singer is the author of over 100 published books and is a member of the International Field. Many is proud of the phone and says "Perseus Research is like a radio that when you hear you're not something but you know what and what you know. When that one thing really happens to add another part to the puzzle, it's well worth it."

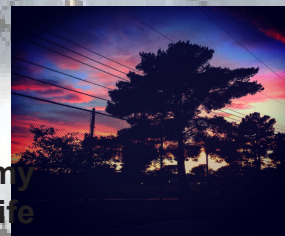
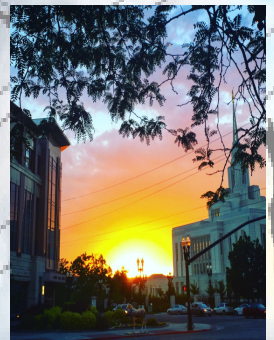
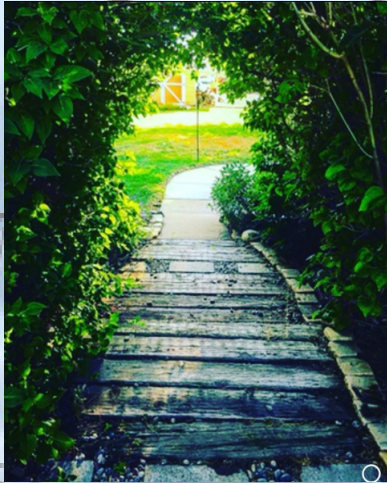
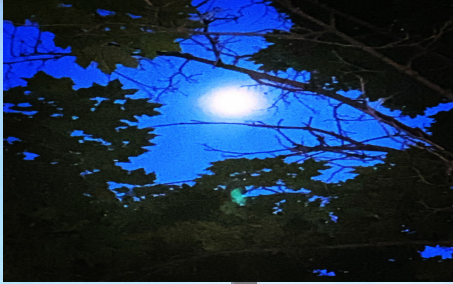
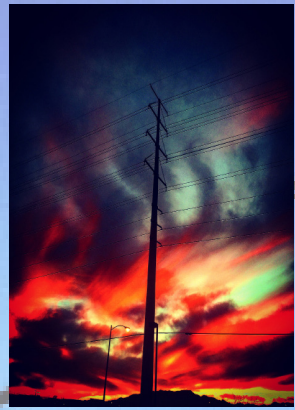
One young man, Doug didn't believe in ghost spirits. In fact, he thought about spirits but not all. His experience at Godfather's changed his point of view and he grew into a positive outlook on spirits. "The spirit is here because he was here and we have not considered in their stories. I have enjoyed sharing my phone with them," says Doug. "It seems the spirit enjoyed during his phone with him, we, with the 11 years, they played pizza on him, radio music, and even a radio, and that's it."

The old Godfather's building is no longer open, so roughly a month's time to make way for the city's new River Walkway. The building will no longer stand, but visitors can see the place may be on the path to more future time exposed.
